Another American Problem

This morning I was talking to a local paint contractor and we turned to the discussion of the plight of almost every small contractor in the U.S.

In his office I could see three places of business for sale or lease. All these were once contractors of one sort or another, but capitulated to the high cost of labor and materials. He informed me this was not just a local thing, but was widespread over the entire

country.

Here is this man's opinion of what is happening: First, supervision has gotten to the point that no man can be trusted. Top men, once trustworthy, are loafing on the job and letting their men get away with things unheard of before. Secondly, manufacturing costs have risen to fantastic heights and the material costs for jobs are often prohibitive. Union shops are no longer able to compete with open shops and many of those going out of business are union shops. Union demands are so outrageous as to be ridiculous at times. (35 hour week, vacation pay, welfare and pension, double and triple pay for overtime and holiday work, etc.). Even in open shops the work is of such poor quality as to be unfit for use therefore many union shops (that do have some work standards) get jobs even at

'The day of the small business is over." These were the exact words of this contractor, who was one of the largest in this part of the country (he sold out his equipment when he speculated in oil and is now dabbling in real estate). "We will all be working for the government in one way or another be-fore too many years pass." This was his prognostication. A pure socialistic government! This is what he sees for us in

the future.

This is just one phase of business in this country. Everywhere you look, business, BIG and small is in real trouble.

Where does your hope lie? In this country? In big business? I hope not! According to this man, the U.S. is down and almost out, and he doesn't know one particle of God's prophecy! This is from his own experience.

- 3. KEEP YOUR EYES MOVING -Each two to five seconds check your side or rear view mirror so you can see the shifting pattern behind, as well as
- 4. LEAVE YOURSELF AN OUT -Too many drivers are trapped into accidents. Keep a space cushion of one car length for each ten miles per hour. This will give you a chance to stop or turn out of the way.
- 5. MAKE SURE THEY SEE YOU —Use your turn lights, give hand signals, pump your brake pedal so your lights will flash and alert the other

These melons along with many other garden products were grown by this family without using commercial fertilizers or insecticides of any kind. They used entirely the humus method, consisting of decayed vegetation and grass from the yard and garden.

CAMPING HINTS

You have now arrived at the Feast of Tabernacles and are about to set up your tent. Here are some more helpful hints to make your stay more pleasant.

First, find the spot on the area designated to your tent that is most level. Use your axe and shovel to clear out roots and/or brush. You may even want to level the ground a bit so you will have a level floor. But remember, anything you do to the grounds will have to be put back in exactly the same shape as you found it.

After you have set your tent up make about a 3" deep ditch around it in case of rain. More water will come up through the floor than the ceiling in case of hard rains.

At night the material in tents contracts and pulls the ropes very taut. Each night loosen these so they will not tear the tent. Next morning tighten them up again.

Life in a tent can be very exciting and fun, but you must prepare for it beforehand. The weather in east Texas is very unpredictable and measures must be taken to insure comfort and health. If you sleep on cots you will need to take as many bedclothes to sleep on as to cover with.

For those that have never attended a Feast it is a wise thing to take both summer and fall clothing as the weather can change from very hot to very cool in a short time.

If these hints are taken your stay will be much more pleasant and enjoyable and you will have fonder memories to take home with you.

How To Do It Column

CARE AND USE OF PAINT **BRUSHES**

Many times when we want to do a fast touch-up or even paint an entire room, we find our paint brush hard as

The following instructions will eliminate this problem and also the costly

replacement of brushes.

Before using a new brush soak it for several hours in raw linseed oil (not boiled linseed oil). This will seal the pores of the wood handle and cause it to swell just enough to prevent the bristles from shedding while painting. It also lubricates the metal band preventing rust damage to bristles and keeps the brush pliable while painting. Brushes can easily be cleaned after use, especially that part of the brush close to the handle.

If you intend to paint for several days you need not clean the brush after each use, but leave it overnight in raw linseed oil. This can be done by drilling a hole in the handle then inserting a small rod through the hande so that the rod will rest the weight of the brush on the lip of the can of oil instead of the brush bristles.

Paint brushes should never be soaked in water under any circumstances; water swells the handle, damaging the

brush permanently.

Kerosene is about the best, yet the the cheapest solvent to clean brushes. Gasoline should never be used in cleaning as this destroys the rubber the bristles are set in under the metal band. Alcohol or special cleaner is needed when cleaning varnish or shellac from a brush or you may store in raw lin-

Valuable Facts About Wine

(Continued from August issue) Part II

In this issue we will give you tips on how to choose and treat wine.

11. European Vintage years are important, because climatic conditions have a large effect on the wine produced from the grapes.

12. Think of wine as something alive. Treat it gently. Do not shake it.

13. Store all still and sparkling wines on their sides, so that the corks are moistened by the wine. The corks are thus kept from drying up and allowing air to seep through and attack the wines.

14. Red wines often have considerable sediment which is natural to the wine. If possible, stand the bottle up a few hours before serving. The sediment will go to the bottom, and the wine will pour off brilliantly.

15. Red wines will expand and give off added aroma if the cork is drawn an hour before serving. This gives the

wine a chance to breathe.

16. Both red and white table wines may be kept for a few days after opening if they are promptly recorked. White wines should be kept in the refrigerator and red wines in a cool place.
