Mr. Thomas Ordained as Local Elder



Apparent Safety

This is the first in a new series of personal adventures by our brethren. You are welcomed to write your experiences for this series—Ed.

The ship lay perfectly still in the calm waters 1500 yards south of the base of Mount Suribachi on Iwo Jima Island. The bow and the stern were aligned at a right angle to the beach so as to present a harder target for the shore batteries to hit.

The main force of over a thousand ships and landing craft, plus a landing force of over fifty thousand Marines, were attempting to take the small island from a beachhead forced on the northern shore. The duty of the cruiser I was on, was to patrol the southern extremities of Iwo, to intercept any possible reenforcements, and to bombard points of resistance that our guns were in a better position to reach.

It was a gloriously beautiful day. The bright, clear-blue sky, the serene blue-green waters with the spectre of Mount Suribachi mirrored in the placid water. From my vantage point at the rail near the after smokestack the battle was just the sound of gunfire, the explosion of shells. I knew a gigantic battle was being waged, with literally thousands of lives being lost, yet there I was, safe and seemingly secure.

As I gazed toward the shore two shells hit side by side about 300 feet on our starboard quarter. Then two

Greetings to all from Rome:

Mr. Hogberg and I are getting a first-hand look at news "in-the-making." Yesterday we were part of a group to which the Pope gave a general audience. It is very difficult to see him, but by using the principle of being wise as serpents and harmless as doves, we made it! The Pope has personality and used humor to good advantage in his

more hit 225 feet away. A few seconds later two more some 150 feet out. I watched in fascination, transfixed to the spot. Seventy-five feet away two more shells splashed into the water! With chills running up my spine and fear running cold in the pit of my stomach, I just stood there and awaited what seemed to be certain death. Fortunately for me and 1,300 other crew members, the next expected explosion never came!

I had been warned by the first set of shells of the imminent danger. I could very well see that the position I held was fraught with danger, and that by remaining there my life could well be forfeited. Nevertheless, I did not heed these warnings and brazenly stood my ground. Sometimes I wonder if that isn't what we do today. Gaze at the warning signs while we loll in apparent safety and security. This time the explosion IS coming, so let's heed the warning signs and change our position before it is TOO LATE!

25-minute plea for unity. We have already had a good look around and if I had to sum up this city in a short sentence, I would call it "Paganism, Past and Present." It seems all the different types of confusion from all over the world have been assembled here and boiled down to a thick concentrate. So long for now.
